Henry Lindseth Dies After 5-Year Illness

Henry Lindseth of Garfield passed away Thursday evening at 4:30 o'clock following an illness of five years duration. His death was caused by heart failure, and was sudden. He was able to be up and around until shortly before his death, and on Saturday of last week was in Madison with his wife. Following the tragic death of his daughter Madlyn in Minneapolis last summer Mr. Lindseth began to fail noticeably, and this shock no doubt hastened the end.

Mr. Lindseth was born in the town of Hamlin February 8, 1885, and was the youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ingebright Lindseth. With the exception of one year that he lived in St. Paul, he spent all of his life in Lac qui Parle county.

In February, 1909, he was married at Duluth to Miss Esther Collins. He is survived by his wife and two sons Raymond and Harlow, three brothers, Peter C., Iver and Hans Lindseth, all of this county, four sisters, Mrs. N. I. Tryggeseth of Dawson, Mrs. Mary Buck of St. Paul, Mrs. Oscar Skallerud and Mrs. Lena Schomburg of Dawson.

Funeral services were held at his home in Garfield and at the Madison Lutheran church Sunday afternoon, Rev. Joseph Tetlie officiating.
