Madlyn Lindseth Dies From Shot After Fight to Save Life

Funeral for Local Girl Held In Madison Luth. Church Monday Afternoon

Miss Madlyn Lindseth, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lindseth, who was shot in Minneapolis early Thursday morning of last week by her employer, when he mistook her for a prowler, died Friday noon at the general hospital, after making a brave fight for life. It was found that the bullet had entered her side and had nearly passed through her body. Every effort was made to save her life, but to no avail. Hope was placed in a blood transfusion, but she gradually grew weaker until death relieved her of her sufferings.

Madlyn Geraldine Lindseth was the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lindseth. She was born in Hamlin township January 30, 1910, and had lived in Lac qui Parle county all her life with the exception of one year, when the family lived in St. Paul. She graduated from the eighth grade of the Garfield public schools, was confirmed in the Madison Lutheran church. She graduated from the Madison high school this spring, leaving later for Minneapolis to take a business course, which she had partly completed when she died. She is survived by her parents and two brothers, besides many other relatives.

The body was brought here by her sorrowing parents last Saturday afternoon and funeral services were held in Madison Lutheran church Monday afternoon, Rev. Joseph Tetlie officiating. The church was packed to overflowing with sorrowing relatives and friends. She was laid to rest in the Madison Lutheran church cemetery and her remains were borne to their final resting place by five of her cousins, Wallace and Orville Skallerud, Floyd Schomberg, Earl and Clifford Lindseth and Hiram Femrite.
